## About Melinda Sherbring



Melinda Sherbring was a software engineer until retiring in Sept. 2013. In 1972, she discovered the Societv for Creative Anachronism (SCA). This historical re-creation group ignited a passion for the history, culture, and crafts practiced before the year 1650. She started researching sweet bags in 1999, and saw her first one in person at the Nottingham

Costume Museum in 2002. In the years since, Melinda has examined both sweet bags and other embroidery behind the scenes at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, the Manchester Gallery of Costume, the National Museum of Scotland, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the DeWitt Wallace Decorative Art Museum in Colonial Williamsburg, Boston's Museum of Fine Arts, and in private collections.

Melinda now teaches needlework locally and nationally, with designs rooted in history. Her first EGA GCC, More Than a Rose, came out in June 2016. Her second GCC, Sweet Bag Sewed of Silver and Gold, comes out in 2019.



## About Uncommon Stitches

*Uncommon Stitches* is an embroidery adventure exploring stitches rarely used in the modern world. This book-shaped box was inspired by decorated 17th century book covers. Many examples in this project are less common variations of stitches you may already know. Others may appear on only one or two historical pieces of clothing, and are presented here for the very first time.

This two-and-a-half day class covers:

- + creating these novel stitches,
- + learning about the pieces they came from, and
- + guidance on finishing the project.

The design features a central cartouche delineated with a unique stitch from a nightcap said to have once belonged to Cardinal Wolsey. Cardinal Wolsey was, of course, Lord High Chancellor for King Henry VIII. The Manchester Gallery of Costume now owns the cap; they date it to the late 1500s, in Elizabeth's reign, instead of earlier.

Inside that oval is your choice of a golden-scaled rampant wyvern or a peacock with tail displayed. Both feature a stitch found on a 1600s-era cushion cover now in Southern California at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. A bee modeled after those on two Elizabethan-era woman's coifs in London's Victoria and Albert museum has landed above the cartouche. Surrounding it are four typically 17th-century-style flower sprigs. The spine features the title of the work, three flower heads, and a space for your own name and the year you finish it. There is even a variant of Spiderweb based on several extant examples that has an even number of spokes.

This project uses some ancient but familiar stitches, such as Blanket, Chain, Satin, Stem, Straight, and Double Running. But it is the uncommon stitches, not found in books or other classes, that give this class its name. Since this project looks like a book, you may stitch the spine and both front and back covers. The instructions provide mirrored images of both designs to mix and match at will. Since it is also a box, you have the option of stitching only the top and spine, thus completing the project that much sooner.

Approximately 4 – 6 hours pre-work required.
