

STEP 1 CROSS STITCH

PURPOSE: To demonstrate proficiency in various cross stitch techniques.

DESIGN SIZE: 240 threads x 384 threads, 8.57" high by 13.71" wide on 28 count linen.

FABRIC: -28 count White or Antique White Linen. Size sufficient to stitch sampler plus a 2" unstitched border on all four sides.

THREADS and COLORS:

Floss: DMC or equivalent

Colors (DMC Color Codes): 310, 321, 552, 699, 720, 725, 824


DESIGN LAYOUT IMAGE and MOTIF LOCATIONS:

Use the graph of the image on page 2 for the overall placement of each motif.

NOTE: The graph paper is 14 to the inch; each box represents two fabric threads.

The dashed and dotted lines represent the bounding box for the enclosed motif.








MOTIF INSTRUCTIONS: This section provides the size, thread type, color, and stitch that is to be used to complete each motif.


Greek Key Border

- > Use the graph to complete a border composed of Greek Keys
- Each Greek Key is 12 threads high and 16 threads wide
- > English method cross stitch
- ➤ DMC Floss Color: 310 Black




Alphabet

- Each letter is 14 threads high x 10 threads wide
- > Marking cross stitch
- ➤ DMC Floss Color: 824 Very Dark Blue



Numbers

- Each number is 14 threads high x 10 threads wide
- > Reversible cross stitch
- DMC Floss Color: 699 Green







Rainbow

- > Stitched area bounding rectangle is 80 threads high x 66 threads wide; each circle is 22 threads in diameter
- > DMC Floss
- Colors: 321, 552, 824, 699, 725, 720, 321, 552, (in this order from top to bottom)
- > Danish method cross stitch
- ➤ Use the white spaces of the rainbow to blend the color change seamlessly from the previous color to the new color shown on the chart starting from the top, as follows:
 - * Red blending into Purple
 - Purple to Blue
 - ❖ Blue to Green
 - Green to Yellow
 - Yellow to Orange
 - Orange to Red
 - * Red blending into Purple
- Use compensating stitches to make smooth curved edges

Use the actual size template to place the Rainbow properly within its bounding rectangle. Use the enlarge/reduce button on the copier to resize the template to fit the space on the sampler. The template must touch both the upper right corner and lower left corner of the bounding box.









Assisi

- ➤ 116 threads high x 132 threads wide (includes border)
- ➤ Outline the Daffodil using the Back-Stitch and DMC Floss, Color: 310, black
- ➤ Use DMC Floss, Color: 321, Red for the Daffodil fill and border
- > Stitch the Daffodil fill using Swedish Tvistom (Long arm cross)
- > Stitch a reversible border using the Holbein stitch








Tulip


- > 76 threads high x 58 threads wide
- English method cross stitch outline indicated by blue boxes on the graph, using DMC Floss Color: 824 Dark Blue
- Leaves, and Stem
 Montenegrin cross stitch
 DMC Floss Color: 699 Green
- Flower petal filling:
 Montenegrin cross stitch
 DMC Floss Color: 725 Topaz.

The arrows on the diagram indicate the direction of the fill




Rectangle with Stripe Fill

- ➤ Size is 14 threads high x 132 threads wide
- > Upright cross stitch without compensation
- > DMC Floss Color: 552 Violet Medium



Rectangle with Triangle Fill

- ➤ Size is 14 threads high x 132 threads wide
- > Italian cross stitch with compensation
- DMC Floss Color: 720 Orange Spice Dark
